# DEMOCRATIC GAINS IN NEXT CONGRESS

## INDICATIONS POINT TO A CLOSE VOTE IN THE HOUSE.

Eighty-five Republicans and 109 Democrats Elected in Districts Thus Far Heard from, a Net Democratic Gain of 41-Returns Are Slow and Total Vote Cannot Yet Be Approximated.

New York, Nov. 2 .- Returns received in the Associated Press office in this city from all over the country up to 12.30 this (Wednesday) morning indicate that eighty-five Republicans and one hundred and nine Democrats have certainly been elected to seats in the national house of representatives. The same districts two years ago returned to the lower house of congress 105 Re publicans and 89 Democrats, Based solely upon the estimates in these districts, a Republican loss of twenty and a Democratic gain of twenty-one is indicated. These estimates concede to the Democrats all of the congressional districts in Greater New York except one, the Fifteenth.

BADLOCK S ESTIMATE.

Washington, Nov. 8, 1 a. m .- Chairman Babcock, of the Republican conpressional committee, has just made the following statement to the Assocluted Preser

"While I am satisfied that the liepublicans will control the house of representatives in the Fifty-sixth congress, it is impossible at this hour to indicate what our majority in the house will be. Thus far we have no definite returns from Illinois Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa or Kansas, Uhio has elected 15 Republicans certainly and two districts seem to be in doubt. From Michigan the returns seem to indicate a solid Republicau delegation. Representative Hawley is re-elected in Texas. Vincent Boering is elected in the eleventh Kentucky and Samuel J. Puch is probably elected in the ninth Kentucky. The election of George M. Davison in the eight Kentucky is in doubt, with chancos seemingly in favor of his election. Adveca from Maryland show that we have elected four representatives certainly. Nincteen members of the delegation from New York state and perhaps more will be Republican. 1. F Fischer, of the tourth New York-Prooklyn-is the only member we have elected in greater New York, The election of Cochran in the nineteenin New York and Mchany in the thirtysecond-Buffalo-is in doubt, From Pennsylvania we thus far have received some measure returns, but the indications are that we have sustained some losses there. Krkpatrick, of the eighth district and Arnold, of the twenty-eight, seem to have been defeated. Unoificial advices from western states show that we have more than held our own and my conviction is that we shall control the house by a safe majority, probably not far from the figures which I gave out last week. The figures referred to by Mr. Bab-

cock were contained in his prediction that the Republicans would have a majority over all of about 25.

THE DEMOCRATIC VIEW. Since early evening Secretary Kerr, of the Democratic congressional committee, and a small corps of political statisticians have been working on returns received at Democratic congressional headquarters. To the Associated
