Her are two countries, each in its day the greatest the world has seen-the forme 30 impressive object lesson of wha may happen to nations who continu these expensive and disastrous war pogeants in time of peace, and thus be tempted by fortune to try the des perate chance of war, and the latter sunk in abject bankruptey and th people ground down to poverty in onof the richest and fairest countries of the universe, simply to maintain this taighty pageautry, which sooner or later will crush out the very life blood of its people.

In this country we have no idea of the enormous drains, financially and otherwise, upon the social, business and intellectual portion of a country neces sary to keep up the vest standing armies, keep pace with and provide for the modern military engines of destruction.

VAST WASTE.

For instance, France and England today have been spending more money in time of peace than we have in ou Spanish war to be prepared to hold of claim dominion over a few tracts o wild land in Asia or Africe, which pro duce no remuneration in the way o commerce, and probably never will,

These vast sums, if diverted int business, educational or charitable purposes, would cause such a state of industry and progress as would aster ish the thinking people of today. Ir addition to this, instead of piling up monumental pyramids of debt for pos ferity, they would bequeath to their descendants a continent whose possi bilities at the present day are undreamed of, while at the same tim by peacefully and scientifically devel oping the Far East and Africa, would dd materially to the world's wealth and thus indirectly to the world's civ ilization.

Another great point, possibly over looked by the vast majority of pee ple, but which forcibly strikes the ral rs and financiers of these countries is the frightful number of drones which each country is obliged to support for the future contingency of war. while the United States, regular and volunteer, practically on a war footing at present only 250,000.

In making this comparison, however, no estimate of the strength of England upon the seas is taken into consideration, and the waste of the srlendid material composing her vasnavies should not be overlooked. This is so much shipping and marine-car rying power going to waste. The 1,000 or more warships of the United Kingdom add nothing to the earnings of the nation and only tend to maintain a somewhat questionable prestige. Their mission is to destroy, not build up the commerce of the world, and in time of peace they are of no mor value than so many pleasure yachts They are the mere waste of coal, en ergy and money from the standpoint of the individual who cries out for a general disarmament.

When one takes into consideration the fact that the American nation with a fighting force less than that of the English on a peace basis and with havy that is a pigmy as compared with that of the latter, are grumbling already about the increased taxes and restrictions incidental to our late with Spain, what must the condition of the foreign nations be under, com paratively speaking, the stupendous extra burdens carried constantly? Taking all these facts into consid-

ation, is it not better to ler unprofitable colonies alone, disband the armies, reduce the navies and develop the natural resources of the mother muntry?
