CORNELIUS SMITH FILES A PROTEST

OBJECTS TO JUDGE GUNSTER RECEIVING WHOLE VOTE.

Sec. 4.—The question shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the city in such manner that they can vote for or against the increase by groups or items, as follows, viz: For building a viaduct on the south side of Lackawanna avenue, over the tracks of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad company, and purchasing right of way for the same, the sum of \$167,526.60.

Sec. 5.—The question of assessing to the qualified voters of the city shall be submitted to a vote of the electors at the general election to be held in February, A. D. 1899.

Sec. 6.—After the passage of this ordinance, and at least thirty days before said election, the mayor shall publish a notice of the election hereby authorized, in the daily newspapers of the city, and the statement required to be published in such notice shall be furnished by the city controller.

BONDING THE CITY FOR \$583,000

VOTERS WILL DECIDE THAT QUESTION NEXT FEBRUARY.

Mr. Oliver Introduced the Ordinance Last Night in Common Council and It Was Referred to the Judiciary Committee—First It Must Pass Councils and Be Advertised According to Law at Least Thirty Days Before Election—All Sections of the City Are Provided for.

In addition to electing a mayor, city controller, and treasurer next February the voters of the city will be required to decide whether the bonded indebtedness shall be increased \$583,000 for the various public improvements contemplated in the bond ordinance.

At last night's meeting of common council Mr. Oliver introduced the ordinance and it was referred to the judiciary committee. Some of the members were desirous of having the judiciary committee report forthwith, but as there is plenty of time between now and February the report will be soon enough the next regular meeting.

Section 1.—Be it ordained by the select and common councils of the city of Scranton, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, that for the purpose of building a viaduct on the south side of Lackawanna avenue over the tracks of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad company, together with the purchase of right of way for the same, for opening and widening streets, for laying city's portion of the construction of sewers, and for the purchase of land for and improvement of parks, an issue of city bonds in the amount of not more than \$583,000 is hereby authorized, subject nevertheless to the consent of the electors of the city of Scranton as herein provided.
