# **EVENTS OF DAY IN** WEST SCRANTON

### CAUCUSES IN FIFTH AND FIF-TEENTH WARDS TODAY.

Politics will once more occupy public attention on this side for a short space of time today. Ward caucuses of the Republican party will be conducted in the Fifth and Fifteenth ward for the purpose of selecting nominees for the several ward offices. Although the cau- few more candidates were placed on cuses will be conducted on much the same lines as heretofore, they occupy the unique position of inauguarating the Crawford county system, under which the Republican party will conduct its city and county primaries during the future.

The struggle in the Fifth ward centers in the fight for the common council and the same is true in the Fif-teenth ward. In the latter the fray has assumed a fierce aspect, there being five aspirants in the field for this honor

Select Councilman R. H. Williams, present incumbent from the Fifth ward in that branch, will be opposed for reelection by his party by Thomas Rees, of South Lincoln avenue. It is said that Mr. Rees is making a strong canvass. The present commoner from this word, John H. Walker, of Division street, will be opposed for the renomination by John T. James, of 313 Fourteenth street. Mr. Walker has an honorable and able record for his first term as an advantage which it will be hard to overcome. Mr. James, how ever, is making a noble fight and honors so far are somewhat in doubt, so his friends say. For the uncertain emoluments of the office of constable in this ward only one candidate has announced himself, Chester Cannier, of Washburn street, a well known railroader is the man. Timothy Jones is the present constable.

For ward assessor there are two candidates, viz: John J. James of Academp street, and David Owens, of South Lincoln avenue. The latter is not the principal of public school No. 22, but s much older man. Both candidates are well known and are striving with might and main for the nomination.

For register of voters for which there is one for each of the four districts. so far only one candidate has announced himself. Griffith Jones, of South Rebecca avenue, is out for this office in the Third district. Of course, the other districts will have their candidates, and an election board will also he voted for at each district.

In the Fifteenth ward so far no interest seems to have been taken in the select councilship, at present represented by Horatio Fellows. Anent the common branch there is no lack of interest. The present incumbent, Joseph Oliver, who has so creditably filled the office for two terms is not a candi-date for renomination and election. However, there are four tried and true men out for it. They are Rich-

ard Thomas, ex-patrolman, of Eynon street, Thomas M. Watkins and Andrew Dingman and Morgan Bevan, of Hampton street, and David Edwards, of West Elm street. Their efforts, each being well known and popular, have caused the lines to be drawn very closely So far as the other ward officers to

be elected are concerned, no interest seems to have been taken in them. Evan L. Evans is out for register of voters in the Second district.







MR. O'BOYLE GIVES NOTICE.
