

CARBONDALE.

\$400,000 A YEAR PAY ROLL.

Such Is the Magnitude of Mr. Fitzgeraid's Froposition.

Mr. Fitzgerald, of Sciention, the mawho proposes establishing a hardware manufactory in this section, addressed the board of trade last night. Briefly his proposition was to have local people raise \$75,960 or \$100,000 to be secured by 20-year first mortgage bords. He will put in the necessary machinery and patterns for the manufacture of builders' hardware. From five to ten acres of land with railroad connection will be necessary.

He will need buildings to cost \$59,000 or \$60,000 which will accommodate from 500 to L000 hands, ninety per cent of which must be skilled mechanics This means a pay roll, said Mr. Fitz-gerald, of \$100,000 per annum.

He showed up hig profits in the business, gave good reasons for desiring to locate in Carbondals and altogether made a very attractive proposal. Ar rangements were made to have him meet the committee on manufacturer next Monday morning.

DEATH OF JAMES O'BRIEN.




