## PRESIDENT TO VISIT CAMP M'KENZIE

#### PEOPLE OF AUGUSTA ENTHUSI-ASTIC OVER PROSPECT.

They Are Making Great Preparations for Receiving Their Distinguished Guest-It Is One Hundred Years Since Augusta Has Been Honored By a Visit from a President-Camp of the Thirteenth Was Never in Better Condition Than it Is at Present-Personal Notes.




