THE MARKETS.

New York, Jan. 4.—Stocks were reactionary in the forenoon and ranged steady upward in the afternoon, led by high priced specialties including Brooklyn Transit, Sugar and Tobacco. The opening was irregular with a tendency both here and in London to take profits, and prices reacted somewhat. Professional traders sought diligently to reach stop loss orders. Many stocks continued to rise. The close was a better one developed in the afternoon and continued until the close.
