MUST BEAR THE DATE. The following amendment as to the cancellation of adhesive documentary and proprietary stamps has been issued by the commissioner of internal revenue:

"Existing regulations are hereby amended so as to require that upon each adhesive documentary or proprietary stamp used or affixed after January 1, 1899, there shall, in addition to the initials of the person using the same and the year in which used, also appear the month and day of the month each adhesive documentary or proprietary stamp may be expressed by numerals—for instance, on a stamp used on January 12, 1899, the date may be written or stamped 1-12-99."
