RESOLUTION ADOPTED AT SES-

The Annexation of the Philippines Opposed on Grounds That They Are Inhabited by 8,000,000 Persons of the Coolie Class, Who Will Be Most Dangerous to American Labor-Effort to Organize Anthra-

Pittsburg, Jan. 10 .- These amendments to the constitution of the United Mine Workers were reported by the committee at this morning's session and were adopted:
