The country is in a stronger position than a week ago. Remarkable strength in its industries is important but is not the chief element. Public confidence in the business of the country and in its securities has been tested to an unusual extent by the sudden fall in stocks and the subsequent rise. Confidence in the value of wheat, corn and cotton has been shown by the markets, and at rising prices the world buys because it has to buy. The vast supply of unemployed capital has been shown impressively, and the new and starillag independency of foreign money markets fixes attention. The lumber movement is unusually large for the season with prices of low grades sharply advanced. Railroad carnings and tonnage have shown surprising gains. Treasury recipts are gaining and a vote on the peace treaty has been fixed for Feb. 6. The weak points in the situation may first be considered.
