The first investigation made by Coroner McKee, who was present, was to ascertain how Edward Flynn, of thregon, died, he having been found dead in bed on a morning of last week. The report of the physician who performed the autopsy was that he died from natural causes and a verdiet was accordingly found by the jury, Upon at little investigation by the reporter as to the necessity for the holding of inquests upon cases of this kind, we were informed that owing to the active work done by some insurance companies of questionable repute, who take risks on snything and everything, the action taken was deemed necessary, as mysterious and sudden deaths have been of frequent occurrence lately. The next case heard was that of John Clienn, who dropped dead in his own house one day last week, just as he had returned from the funeral of a near friend. The usual autopsy showed that death was the result of heart disease. The last investigation was that of the late Peter Connell, whose murder was reported in The Tribune a few hours after the unfortunate affair hapround. The autopsy made by Dr. Underwood revealed that the victim had been shot directly through the upper portion of the heart, and the wound vas sufficient to produce instant death. There were three men arrested for complicity in the crime, but as yet there has not been evidence obtained to place the blame where it belongs, and conscouetely the jury had to submit the verdict that he came to his death by a bullet would at the hands of persons unknown to the jury.


