COMPLETE NEW CAPITOL.

Commission and Provides That Another Commission Be Constituted to Finish the Building-Mr. Boyd Introduces an Anti-Trust Bill-Appropriation Measures In-

Harrisburg, Jan. 21 .- Mr. Hasson, of Venango, introduced in the house today a bill appropriating \$2,000,000 to complete the new capitol. The measare abolishes the present commission and provides that the governor, ex-Auditor General Gregg, of Reading; ex-Licutenant Governor Watres, of Scranton; Benjamin F. Jones, of Pittsburg; A. J. Cussatt and ex-Governor Pattison, of Philadelphia, and A. A. Plummer, of Franklin, be constituted a commission to finish the building. It recites that "the commissioners are autherized to proceed with the least possible delay to procure the construction of a capitol building and furnishing the same, either by completing the present structure, remodelling the same, or by removing it and erecting an entirely new structure on revised plans, as in their judgment may be deemed advis-

The commissioners are to receive no compensation for their services.

New York, Jan. 31.—The average recession in stock values today was fractional. There was no pronounced pressure to zell as was shown by the diminished volume of business. There were transactions in about three-quarters of a million shares which formerly would have been considered a large day's business but, which is the smallest amount traded in, in some time for a full day's session. London continued a moderate seller on balance and the market showed alternate spells of strength and weakness. The traders were free sellers at the opening and prices ran off fractionally except for dealings of a point and over in Reading first preferred.
