Failures in January were smaller than in any previous month except August, 1898, and July, 1897, and the proportion of solvent payments to clearing house exchanges is smaller than in any other month of which records exist. In January they were but \$6 cents per \$1,000 clearing house payments, and the smallest in any previous month had been about \$1.08 per \$1,000. The defaulted liabilities were \$7,728,837 against \$10,451.513 last year, a decrease of 26 per cent, and 58 per cent, smaller than in 1897, 57 per cent, smaller than In 1856, 50 per cent smaller than in 1895 and 76 per cent. smaller than in 1894. It is pertinent to note that the remarkable expansion in the aggregate of business payments comes in spite of a material decline in prices during the past seven years so great that payments of \$82,000,000 would cover about as much business as payments of \$100,-000,000 in 1892.
