

New York, Feb. 14.-Stocks today ad-vanced moderately above the prices pre-valing before the triple holiday. The commission house business was much re-stricted as the severe storm had de-layed mail orders and kept away many costomers. The attendance on the Stock exchange was diminished and prices re-coded fractionally during the carly trad-ing. The London market, too, was dull because of the storms throughout Eng-land and "Yankee" ralls which showed weakness before our opening because of the bilzgard were subsequently bought for London account. Burlington was a most prominent stock for strength on a rumor that a refunding plan would be put through at tomorrow's meeting, al-though the story lacked confirmation. Weather conditions were responsible for lifting prices of the anthracite coalers and hubber. Prices continued to harden with but temporary periods of hesitation and the closing was strong. Total sales were 281.40° shares. The bond market ruled frequiar during the forenoon but subsequently hardened under the influ-che of a good demand of the active liens. Total sales were \$2,755,600.

Carrington & Co's. Letter. New York, Feb. 14.—The sales of stocks today have been light owing to the ab-sence of a great number of traders caused by the storm and general blockade of traveling facilities. The market opened fairly active considering the severe weather and was somewhat irregular, the prices reflecting the deather condi-tions. The anthracite coal stocks and industials which were favored by the ''ll wind' showed marked strength and in some instances sharp advances. Jer-say Central opened up 2 points, Delaware and Hudson 2%, Rubber advanced 3 points during the day. Barlington and Quincy advanced 4% points in prospective devel-opments of importance to that road. The balance of the Granger group were dull and heavy during the first hour, but de-veloped strength later influenced by Bur-lington and Quincy. American Steel and Wire opened up 1% points and held firm during the day. The London declined fractionally after coening on reports of New York sales.
