CUBANS MORE WILLING TO AC-CEPT AMERICA'S OFFER.

Hayana, Feb. 19 .- The reports of Cubans relecting the \$2,00,,000 loan from the United States for the payment of the insurgent troops are baseless. The plans which are under discussion are for the purpose of securing an additional loan of \$7,000,000. The Cuban Azsembly no longer talks of questioning Comez's authority to pledge its cooperation with the American authorities in dispanding the insurgents, and the only aim of the Assembly's members now is to fall in line with Gomes and to carry out his policy.
