### IN THE PLAY HOUSES.

Digby Bell's New Play.

Digby Bell would always be greeted with a great house if he simply announced himself as the sole performer in a pantomime, and although now Laura Joyce Bell's big contralto voice is seldom heard in song, and both seem to have abjured opera, in which they were such favorites, their popularity in less musical roles does not wane.

Mrs. Frances Hodgson Burnett has been phenomenally successful in her dramatic work and this latest effort will add new laurels to her crown. It is utterly unlike the impossible "Lady of Quality" and partakes of the grace and fresh natural undercurrent of sentiment that pervades "Esmeralda." It is a play that contains many of the elements and hold the hearts of the people as have "The Old Homestead" and "The Little Minister." There are certain portions which would bear cutting, but as a whole the production is most satisactory.

The plot is one that William Black ouched upon in one of his latest novis, when he made the daughter of a horse jockey and a trainer the central figure in a story where the father's sacrifice for the sake of concealing his past from the girl formed many dra-

In Mrs. Burnett's play Joe Hurst is an uneducated proprietor of a wax works show whose fair daughter has been all her life in a fashionable Parisian school, never having seen her father and believing him to be a gentleman. When she comes home she takes him for an upper servant, and the heart-sore old man, to save her feelings and her happiness, determines to carry out the Illusion and by the aid of his old friend, Mrs. Bonney, to allow her to know him only in his menial capacity. She has become engaged to a younger son of a nobleman and the situation is complicated by the disaplearance of his mother, Ludy Montambyn, who believes the girl's origin to be common and endeavors to disc over the secret. A visiting hairdresser tells her the truth, that the serving man is Linda Hurst's father, and the haughty woman processls to make it unpleasant for all parties, accusing the girl of being in the plot to deceive her son. In the meantime, Joe determines to go away and thus save his child from the misery of the shame which must be hers. The curtain falls on the second, when the girl, weeping, declares to her lover and his scornful mother that neither she nor one of the others is worthy to touch her father's shoes, that he is the tenderest, noblest, truest soul in the world.

As a result, she runs away, too, and finds her father in the ante-room of the wax works show, after he has had an unpleasant scene with Lady Montanbyn. The abstraction of papers from that lady's desk enter into the plot, as they are in Joe Hurst's possession. Everything, however, disentangles itself, as the girl tells him she does not want to be a lady but her dear rather's daughter, and the play closes with a reconcilation all round. A wax works figure of Richard Coour de Lion in armor is a prominent feature in te play and affords a delicate bit of sentiment in its course.

Digby Bell in the role of the ignorant old man, with his hopeless cockney accent, his utter ignorance of other life than that of his vulgar calling and his pathetic devotion to his daughter, gives it a tender, beautiful dignity which, mingled with the comedian opportunitles, afford him a scope hitherto unappropriated in his stage career.

Laura Joyce Bell has an interesting part which she takes well in the character of Mrs. Bonney. The honors of the play are strongly contested with Miss Louise Riel as Lady Montanbyn, who assumes a difficult role with rare

Miss Carrie Keller is a pretty and graceful Linda Hurst, whose best work comes out in the last act. The best comedy in the production is done by Edward de Wade as Jakes.
