Blair that he is he only one of the very rich men in this country who has directed all his affairs and accumulated a vast fortune from headquarters outside of a great city. Be hat as it may, there are few men who have had a wider knowledge of this country, its possibilities and its development than he,

BEGINNING OF A CAREER.

John Inslee Blair was born on Aug. 22, 1892, at what was then a little settlement in the woods, two miles below Belvidere, N. J., on the Delaware river. His ancestors were Scotch Presbyterlans. The founder of the family in this country was John Blair, who came from Scotland and settled in New Jersey in 1720. He and his brother, Samuel Blair, who came to this country a year or two later, were both clergymen and were among those who procured from Governor Belcher the original charter for Princeton college. John Blair became the professor of moral philosophy in the college and Samuel Blair vice president and pro-John L. Blair's fessor of rhetoric. grandfather, Samuel Blair, a son of the Princeton professor, was the manager and one of the owners of the old Oxford iron furnace in the centre of Warren county, N. J. The iron from the furnace had to be shipped by Delaware river beats. Somebody had to attend to the loading of the boats and the general shipping of the iron, and so Samuel Blair sent his son, John I. Blair's father, to the point on the Delaware river where the fron was put on the boats. This was known as Foul Rift,

WANTED TO BE RICH.

When John I. Blair was old enough he attended a school in the neighborhood for a few winters. He was far mere interested, however, in the busy life about the iron furnace and the shipping place than in an education. The one thing that he desired was to make money. One day, shortly after his tenth birthday, he said to his moth-Mother, I have got seven brother

and three sister. That's enough in the family to be educated. I am going to get rich.

The first money he earned was by trapping muskrats and rabbits and selling their skins at \$1 for sixteen. Before he was 11 years old he was a clerk in the general store of his cousing at Hope. At 14 he was considered the best storekeeper in that part of the country. He thought he was himself, and at 17 he owned a store of his own The store was situated on what was known as Grand Hill, which is now within the confines of Blairstown. He took his cousin John for a partner and they opened a general store. It is said that the capital put into the business was \$500. A couple of years later Mr. Blair borrowed some money from his mother and bought out his cousin. In two years he was able to keep a clerk. and he brought his brother James from the home farm. Two years later he started a branch store at Marksborough, where he made James his part-Then he opened another store at Johnsonburg and put Robert, another brother, in as his manager. By 1830 he had five general stores in operation. The others were at Paulins and Huntsville. In each of these stores he had some of his brothers or brothers-in-

PLAN OF BUSINESS.

His plan of doing business was this: There was no ready money in that neighborhood, products being the currency. Mr. Blair would buy the crops of the farmers in all the surrounding rounties as cheaply as possible, paying for them in merchandise from his stores. Then he would market the grain and other crops in this city or in Newark. To do this he had to em ploy a great number of teams and his wagons were always on the road. His drivers were also supercargoes, and if they could make a successful deal on road they were instructed to do so. It was not unusual for them to buy a load of pork or buckwheat when only half way or less on the road home from market. Immediately upon loading the grain or the pork, back they would start for market again,

Since then he has built, either entirely with his own capital or with the capital of others associated with him wholly or in part, nearly thirty railroads. These roads include the Oswegoand Ithaca; Leggett's Gap; Warren; sections of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western; the Lackawanna and Bloomsburg: Burlington, Cedar Rapids and Northern; part of the Union Paeitle; Sioux City and Yankton; Sioux Falls and Dakota: Chicago and Northvestern; Chicago and Pacific; Chicago, lowa and Dakota; sections of the New York, Susquebanna and Western: St. Louis and Hannibal; Bangor and Port-Kansas City and Southern; Cayuga and Susquehanna; Cedar Rapids and Missouri River; Green Bay, Stevens' Point; Sloux City and Pacific; Iowa Falls and Sioux City; Chicago, and Missouri Valley; Maple River, Sussex and Mount Hope: Kansas City. Osceola and Southern.

THE D., L. & W. From the first railroad which he built Mr. Blair, with others, developed what is now the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western system. It was not until 1860 that he undertook railroad building in the west. In that year he was sent as the presidency. After the convention ride over the lines of the Chicago, Iowa and Nebraska raliroad. The railroad officials were anxious to extend the line further west, and, knowing that Blair was a very wealthy man, they wanted to interest him in the road if possible. He looked the road and the country over, liked what he saw and decided to put money into the scheme One of the railroad officials asked him to look after the building of the extension of the road to Omaha,

"John J. Blair," was the answer. Soon after that Mr. Blair took all the onstruction work off the company's ands and built the road. That road is now part of the Chicago and Northwestern system. A few years ago Mr. Blair with considerable pride made the statement that he had built every road with which he had ever been connected for each and without putting a dollar's worth of its stock on the market to raise money. He calculated that in his railroad operations he had spent \$26 -000,000, all of which he either advanced himself or raised among his friends, In the building of all his western roads Mr. Blair secured enormous land grants as premiums. In connection with his work on the Union Pacific he got 1,000,000 acres of land in Iowa. For finishing the Iowa Falls and Sioux City road he got 700,000 acres. For building the Sioux City and Pacific road, from Sioux City to Omaha, and the Blair cut off from Missouri Valley junction, on the Chicago and Northwestern, connecting it with the Union Pacific at Tremont, he got 640,000 acres of land. LAND OPERATIONS.

With all this land on his hands, reeived as premiums for building railoads. Blair had to do something with He formed land companies, and these companies, under his direction, have laid out the sites for what are now more than 100 flourishing cities and towns in the west. In his railroad building it was usually Mr. Blair's ustom to take a road that somebody had begun and failed to complete, rebuild it entirely or complete it, and then lease it or sell it to a trunk line after connecting it with the trunk line. In this way he made a profit on the railroad building, acquired great quantities of valuable land, and made more money by selling or leasing the road he had thus rehabilitated.

The last road that Mr. Blair built was the Kansas City, Osceola and Southern. This road was completed only last year, and the finishing touches were put on under a direction other than his. Before the road was completed Mr. Blair leased it to what railroad men call the 'Frisco Line, and the terms of that lease show what kind of bargain he was accustomed to drive. No one else owns a dollar in the road, The 'Frisco Line wanted it for a connection, and he told the managers that his property was not for sale, but that he would lease it to them at a monthly rental of \$2,000 with 40 per cent, of the gross receipts in addition. The road is 110 miles long and connects Kanoche Junction with Osceola, Mo. directors of the 'Frisco Line laughed at the old gentleman, and he told them that he didn't care a hang whether they took his road or not.
