FARMER WINTHROP CAPTURES A THPLE-FOOT TIGER.

Funents That Prompted an Attempt at Suicide in Montrose-Erie Contracts Its Pass and Mileage Book Privileges - Railroad Changes. Thousands of Crows Swarm About Elk Mountains-Personal and Other Notes.

Susquehanna, Feb. 28 .- It remained for Farmer Winthrop, of the Lynn section, to capture a three-foot tige on the hills of Susquehanna county. Late last summer the remnants of a one-horse menagerie arrived on the Winthrop farm. The owner of the outfit was ill and begged to stay a few weeks. When the showman recovered he was financially embarrassed, so he left a young tiger and three monkeys as security for the bill. The showman never sent the cash and Farmer Winthrop fell heir to the fag end of the show, A few days ago the tiger escaped from his cage, and after killing and devouring the monkeys, which were running loose in a shed, fled to the woods, and all the farmers roundabout were terrorized. Farmer Winthrop secured a posse of men, and taking along the big cage, started in pursult of the tiger. At first they could not locate him, but later they became satisfied that he was lurking on a mountain three miles distant. The steel traps used to trip wild animals have no toeth, and the jaws come together in a way to give one a leverage on the other. This kind of a trap was adopted. The chain was replaced with a half inch rope, and as soon as a suitable spot had been selected they exavated a hole, buried the trap out of sight and then heat down a sapling and tied the end of the rope to it. This sapling is held down by a trigger. which a sharp pull would release When the trap had been set no eye could detect anything suspicious about the spot. The men departed about sundown and remained in the woods about half a mile from where the trap had been set and walted. About 10 o'clock they heard screams and long, deep snarts and screams echoing through the woods, and, taking their firearnes and a rope, they went hast-ily to the spot where the trap had been placed. On reaching the spot a strange sight met their gaze. There was the hungry young tiger caught by the hind foot and hanging head downward from the swaying sapling. He hung about three feet from the ground, and as far as he could reach it in every direction had pulled up the bushes by the roots. There was a foot of chain before he got to the rope, and the way he bit at the chain is described as terrifying. The men decided to wait until morning before they attempted to cage the heast. When morning came, however, they brought up the cage, and, getting two or three ropes around him, made him a prisoner. His foot was badly swollen, and he seemed weak and able to make but little resistance. The farmers of the Lynn section breathe easier. 

THOUSANDS OF CROWS. For months past crows, to the number estimated at 16,000, have swarmed

on Elk mountains, feeding in the fields and barnyards in the daytime and collecting at night in the trees on the top of the mountain. About dusk these birds gather in from the surrounding country in myriads, and the noise they make by their shrill "caw! caw!" 18 deafening. Frequently they alight in such vast numbers on the trees that large limbs are broken under their weight. One day recently a black cloud of these birds was crossing the Ontario and Western tracks, when the smoke of a passenger engine blinded them. They flew against the sides of the swiftly-moving cars, and partles who watched the strange sight counted 200 that had met death in the above manner. A party of Carbondale hunters armed themselves with shotguns, few days since, and visited the roost, with the avowed intention of ridding

it of the shining black pests. Six of them shot and killed 175 in less than two hours, but at the end of that time the diminution of the birds was not noticeable, and the hunters retired from the field. Frequently the bleds would rise in such clouds that they would almost obscure the sun. During he late blizzard the birds, maddened y hunger, attacked cattle and sheep in the barns, and were driven away with difficulty. The horse of a peddler was attacked on the highway near Herrick by a large number of the birds. The peddler saved his steed by furious driving and by throwing a bundle of sheepskins off his sleigh to appease the hunger of the black hords.
