AXLES OF CARS AND ENGINES. Steel axles are made from bessemer steel, although open hearth steel is much better but its cost prevents its use only in special cases. The steel is poured from the converter to the ingot molds, taken to the rolls and formed into blooms seven inches square. The bloom is heated and pounded to the correct shape and size in a similar manner to the iron axie. The objection to the steel axle is based on its liability to contain blow-holes, formed during the pouring, and which cannot be taken out or discovered under the hammer. There are several patent methods of treating steel for axles that it is claimed removes the effect of the blow-hole and toughens the steel, but the methods are so expensive that their use has not become general.
