# At Bedtime HAPPENINGS OF

SERIOUS CHARGE PREFIRRED AGAINST A BOARDER.

Tony Kay Is Alleged to Have Allenated the Affections of Mrs. Frank Supticko-To Make Matters Worse, They Remove All the Household your work Effects When Leaving-The Woman Is Charged with Intent to Defraud - Preparing to Accord Company H Boys a Reception.

"Tony" Kay, of North Scranton, was held in \$500 bail for his appearance at court, by Alderman Roberts yesterday afternoon. Kay is charged with lardefrauding a board bill, and, worst of all, with alienating the affection of his boarding boss' wife. Kay boarded with Frank Supticko, of Put nam street, who is the man who caused the former's arrest.

It is a strange tale of love, cupidity and deceit, which was brought out at the hearing. Thursday morning, Supticko, all unsuspecting and trustful of his wife's good conduct, went to work Kay remained at home, saying he was going to see a friend away on a train. After a sufficient length of time had passed, Kay and Mrs. Supticko packed up the household effects, a horse and wagon was secured and everything carted away, including the betrayed husband's trunk, which contained a large sum of money.

When Supticko returned from work he found only an empty house. Neighbors informed him of what had occurred and he lost no time in having a warrant sworn out for Kay's arrest. Constable Smith, after a long hunt, located the boarder and arrested him.

A warrant was also served on Mrs. Supticko at the instance of J. S. Arnold, an installment house agent. Arnold alleges that the woman purchased goods from him to the amount of fourteen dollars and he charges her with intent to defraud, the goods claimed having been taken with the others. She was to have been given a hearing last night, but it was postponed until the goods can be seized.




