On and after March 14, 1899, a penalty of 5 per cent. will be added to all taxes remaining unpaid. W. E. Correll, Collector.

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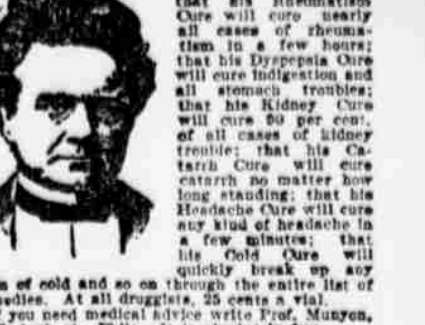
