John Zurenski is a young Polander is years old, and for some time was a boarder in the house of Paul Barton at Smithville, a small mining settlement between this city and Avoca. John had been on a spree for several days, and yesterday he entered his boarding house in a very remorseful frame of mind. He divested himself of coat and vest and went upstairs to his room. He was there but a few minutes when a shot was heard, and Barton, going to where the report came from, found Zurenski lying on the floor and a revolver close by his side. He had deliberately shot himself in the side and the bullet plowed into his body and lodged below the heart. He would give no satisfactory information why he wishes to take his life, and in the meantime the mine ambulance was procured and he was brought down here to the hospital. After an exammation it was decided not to attempt to probe for the leaden missile for the present. He is a strong and sturdy man, and while the wound is a very dangerous one, he did not seem to real ize his critical condition.
