# THE MARKETS.

Wall Street Review.

New York, March 16.-The sensational rise in sugar today was largely responsible for the elimination of much of the short interest in the rest of the list. material gains appearing, notably among the specialties while the railways at the high points averaged 11/2 cents up, but there were no recessions from the best and the market closed under pressure. It was a wild day on the exchange, sugar figuring from over a 14 cent of a million shares with the aggregate trade reaching nearly a million shares. The market was moving cautiously upward when sugar burst into prominence and touched 170, rise to 29% points over last night, 11 points above the September boom prices of '97. The stock closed at 159 2. fluctuations were erratic, an instance in point being the drop of 10 points on two transactions from the high point A trader sold 300 of the 800 shares traded at 176 and within a moment covered at 160, the only intermediate transaction being 100 shares at 169. Thus the broker realized \$3,000 on his short sale There was various rumors connected with the movement in sugar, among them the report that the trade war had been settled, that an agreement had been reached with the Glocose Refining company and the Doscher and Arbuckle interests. People in the trade generally discredited the rumors, professing ignorance of any deal upon which they would be likely posted were it in existence. Local interests identified with

the concerns mentioned likewise discredited the reports. In some quarters the movement was attributed to a corner in the stock and a punishment of the shorts, while on the other hand a house which was active in the dealings claimed to be in ignorance of the reason for the advance, but thought it of too great magnitude to have been merely a manouevre against the shorts. Tobacco after yielding 712 points made an extreme rise of 101/2 to 216, in sympathy with the movement in sugar. Glucose also rose 9 points to 75, coincident with the movement in augar. New York Air Brake touched 200, a rise of 15 points; Metropolitan jumped 5% to Specialist in Diseases of Manhattan 8 to 11214; Brooklyn Transit to 2% to 102: Consolidated Gas 6% to 221, and Burlington 41/2 to 1471/2. The other grangers sympathized in a lesser degree in the advance. Stiffen-

New York, March 18.—The market after a fairly strong opening hung in the air for the first two hours of business. About 12 o'clock Sugar began an advance which carried prices of the stock 25 points above opening and started a covering throughout the entire list which carried prices up from large fractions to very large units in the advance. Such a market as today's has not been seen in the street in years. The cornering of shorts throughout the whole list discloses the fact that stocks in the majority of cases are so closely held that the floating supply was comparatively limited and that with any case at all in money, it is a very simple operation to advance almost anything without regard to prices or position in the market. The day's fluctuations are bound to have a bad effect temporarily at least. Where speculation runs so wikity rammant as it has today, the conservative trader is almost sure to withdraw from active speculation and we do not advise any heavy dealings until the market has settled down to a more normal condition. 160 days during the current year. A strike of furnace men and helpers at the South Chicago mills of the Illinois Steel company is threatened, About 1.100 men are involved. In the recent advance in wages the furnace men and helpers claim to have been neglected.

A compound locomotive from Richmond, Virginia, was recently given a thorough test on the Erie. It was re-cently tested on the Albany & Susquehanna road, and it is said that both tests were highly successful. It is expected that ten more such locomotives

will be built for the Erie.

After an idleness of six months stack No. 5, of the Allentown Iron works is being put in shape for restarting. A force of men were put at work March 11, clearing up and getting the furnace in readiness. The stack is in good share and will be blown in within two weeks.

The great breach in the central part of Mahanoy Plane, caused by the cav-ing in of the Lawrence colliery workings over a week ago, has been filled to a level with the surrounding ground, and the Schuylkill Traction line, which was pulled down by the subsidence, is

in operation again. Advances in the wages of cotton mill peratives were announced on Monday by the Cabot mills, Brunswick, Maine (1,000 hands); York corporation, Saco, Maine, (1.500 hands), and the Paul Whiting Manufacturing Co., Rock-dale and Northbridge, Massachusetts (600 hands).

Manager Gilbert M. McCauley, or the Central Iron and Steel company, Har-risburg, which includes the Universal Mills, Paxson Mills and Mills No. 2, posted a notice that on April 1 a readjustment and raise in wages would take place. This will affect six hundred hands

The old Pond Creek coiliery at Hazleon, which has been filled with water or the past twenty years, was tapped recently and the flow of water coming from the same was something tremendous. The workings were tapped by skilled miners, who drilled holes some thirty feet in advance of them, and the last charge was fired by a dynamo. As soon as the workings have been drained the company will proceed to mine the vast amount of coal which exists there, and which will give employ ment to a large number of men, be making the old town boom again.
