How St. Patrick's Day Was Observed in This City-A Rumpus in the Select Council Chamber-Funeral of Zurenki, the Suicide-A Column of Locals Printed for the First

It can easity be placed on the calendar of time on local events that yesterday was the quietest and most unostentatious in the history of this city so far as it may refer to St. Patrick's Day. Several weeks ago the several branches of the Ancient Order of Hibernians had completed arrangements for a more than usual observance in bonor of their patron saint. A large parade was arranged for which would include all the societies in the ounty, likewise the membership of other organizations, but in the meautime the hand of death intervened and removed from our midst their beloved paster, the late Father Finnan. This caused a cessation of these arrangements, and instead the parady was abandoned and yesterday morning instead of assembling on Main street, amidst the blaze of trumpets and the Eyeg of national colors, the governt dayslons met at their lodge rooms and a 9 o'eleck marched in a body to St. ohn's church, where solemn high mass was sung for the repose of the soul of their much revered and honored deceased pastor. Around the city there were many noticeable features, denoting the importance of the day for our Irish citizens. Many places were hung with green bunting and flags, imprinted with the harp and entwined with the stars and stripes. In the evening the streets were crowded, and, to the credit of our Irish people, there were no disturbances to mar the quiet features of the day, and later the annual event closed by several balls and entertainments, the former by the Entis club at Keystone halt and the Crystal Social club at the armory, In Upper Pittston the Daughters of Erin held an entertainment and supper in the Campbell's Ledge hall, and in both numbers and merit it was a successful financial affair.

There was a high old time in the city hall on Thursday night when, at a meeting of the select council Member Hennegan protested against the attempt of Chairman Langan to entertain a motion sprung by one of the members.
