





Mr. Oram was a resident of Dover, N. J., and was the father of Mrs. F. L. Phillips, of this city. He was well known here, especially among the old-er residents. In 1857 and up to 1862, he, together with a man named Davis, operated the old drifts near Minooka, which were later gotten control of by Congressman Connell. He became interested in large real estate deals in New Jersey and left here. He was closely connected with Dover's growth. but his greatest work was the founding of Port Oram, about two miles from Dover. He reclaimed many acres






