ROOSEVELT TALKS ON CANNED BEEF

INTERESTING TESTIMONY OF COLONEL OF ROUGH RIDERS.

He Declares That He Considers the Canned Roast Beef Issued to the Army in Cuba Utterly Unwholesome and Believes That It Was the Cause of Much of the Sickness. Testimony Before the Court of In-

New York, March 26,-Governor Roosevelt was the principal witness yesterday before the only session held in this city of the court of inquiry appointed to investigate the charges made by General Miles concerning the quality of the beef furnished to the

army during the recent war. Practically the only reason for holding a session here was the desire of the court to obtain personally from the colonel of the Rough Riders his precise views on the character of the rations issued to his men.

The governor declared that he conidered the cannel roast beef issued to the army in Cuba and while homeward bound on the transports as being utterly unfit and unwholesome and the ouse of much illness. His own men were unable to eat it; he had tried ineffectually to do so. Before leaving Chicago on Wednes-

day the court telegraphed to Governor Hoosevelt, asking at what time he could most conveniently appear before The latter replied that 11 o'clock on Saturday morning would suit him very well and precisely at that hour he stepped out of the elevator on the top floor of the Army building in Whitehall street, and briskly entered room N, in which the members of the court had just gathered. Then he threw off his oat and asked where he should sit. Colonel Davis indicated a chair at the middle of the table and the governor seated himself, facing Major Lee, and smilingly intimated that he placed himself at the disposal of the court.
