APPROPRIATIONS IN THE SENATE

THE HOSPITALS AND FISHER-IES ARE REMEMBERED.

Seven Months' Term School Bill Passed in Senate-Gubernatorial Appointments Are Ratified-Measure in Interest of Good Roads.

Harrisburg, Merch 28,-In the senate today these appropriation bills passed

Florence Crittenden home at Williamsport, \$2,000; Adrian Hospital association of Jefferson county, \$15,000; Phoenixville hospital, \$25,000; state ommissioners of fisheries, for the purchase of property and the erection of buildings in Salisbury township, Le-high county, 15,000; Valley Forge commissioners, for the acquisition of additional ground, \$10,000; Chester county hospital 215,000.

The following bills also went through on final passage: Giving to cities and boroughs the right of eminent domain to acquire the works of incorperated water companies.

Mr. Flinn called up the bill making the minimum school term seven months and its passage was opposed by Mr. Hertaler, who declared that the farmer clicardy has enough burdens to carry, on the other hand Mr. Cummings said he believed in legislating for brains and he saw no good reason why the bill should not pass. Mr. Henry thought that the bill was favorable to the couniry members, as he stated that after most of the money for the public schools came from the cities and from the corporations. He referred to the fact that under the re-distribution of the school funds made by the last legslature Philadelphia lost \$219,000 and Pittsburg \$15,000. In opposing the measure Mr. Merrick made a plea for what he termed home rule and he declared that the seven months' terms should not be forced upon the poor curai districts.

After further debate the bill passed simally by a vote of 30 to 10. The negative vote was: Messrs, Boyd, Grady, Haines, Hertzler, Hummel, Lee, Mer-rick, Miller, Berks; Neely, Vaughan.

Another bill introduced by Mr. Magee appropriates \$20,000 to the commission for the purpose of beginning its work and a third bill also read in place by Mr. Magee extends to cities of the second and third classes and to towns and boroughs the act entitled "An act to authorize the cities of the first class of the commonwealth to levy a tax and make appropriations for the establishment and maintenance of free

These gubernatorial appointments were received by the senate:

William Perry to be justice of the peace for the borough of Cross Creek, Washington county; Marvin D. Patterson to be justice of the peace for Woodbury, Blair county; Caleb S. Brinton to be justice of the peace for

The governor notified the senate that he signed the bill validating the acts of justices of the peace. The senate adjourned until 8 o'clock

In the House.

In the house today a bill providing or the care and attention of employes injured in and about anthracite mines was defeated on final passage.

Senate bill creating a civil service board in second class cities for the exand policemen was read the second time on special order.

The bill amending the Act of May 1874, relating to the taxation of public property for public purposes and places of religious worship, so as to include all assessments for paving, volves twelve important characters. sewers, water pipes and other muni-

cipal charges was defeated. Chairman Hosack, of the ways and means committee, introduced a bill providing for the payment of a bonus of one-third of one per cent, upon the capital stock now actually employed in Pennsylvania of certain foreign corporations, limited partnerships and joint stock associations now registered

in this commonwealth. Mr. Fow, of Philadelphia, presented by request a petition signed by 500 vitizens of Lackawanna county, asking for the impeachment of Judges Archbald, Gunster and Edwards, of Lackawanna county, for unlawful and unconstitutional acts and conduct in their judicial capacity in the trial of he famous Jennings case against the Lehigh Valley railroad.

These bills passed finally at the af-

and game birds and song and insectivorous birds; making it lawful to fish with baskets or fish pots, set nets and out lines; providing for the construction and maintenance of side paths along the highways in townships for the use of bicycles and pedestrians; providing for the appointment of side path commissioners; prescribing their duties and the duties of the assessors in the assessment of bicycles; providing for levying, collecting and disbursement

of a tax on bicycles, On motion of Mr. Hang, of Schuylkill, postponed bill authorizing the election of borough supervisors for the opening of streets and crossings in boroughs was taken up and finally passed. The bill providing for the examination and licensing of engineers having charge of steam boilers, steam engines and appliances in cities of the first class also passed finally. The bill repealing the local option law in borough of Rankin, Allegheny county, passed by a vote of 104 to 41.

Mr. Kreps, of Franklin, introduced a bill to amend the first section of the act of June 8, 1893, relating to mandamus, enlarging the power of the court of common pleas of the county in which the seat of government is or may be located to issue writs of mandamus. Senate bill providing for the adjustment of Hens against unpatented land and for the granting of patents for such

lands to the present owners.

Mr. Heidelbaugh, of Lancaster, preinted a bill repealing the act of April 1808, relating to fees of county officers in the county of Lancaster, Alle-Montgomery, Philadelphia, Reaver and Washington.

The Hosack liquor license bill was the only revenue measure considered at the evening session. The measure was taken up for second reading and passed without opposition. The personal property tax bill and the bill taxing orders for wages, pass books, etc., were not called up. Thirty-nine bills, making appropriations to state and semi-state institutions was read

the second time. No action was taken on the bills making an appropriation to complete the capitol. After the revenue and appropriation bills had been disposed of the house took up the general calendar of second reading bills and after passing several on this stage adjourned until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

New York, March 28.—Strength prevailed nearly all day in the stock market with total dealings of over a millon shares. The effect of extensive realizing was not felt until near the clone when the tone was easy but the recessions still left material advances in many stocks. Practically the only laggards in the list were the Morgan stocks, including the Coalers, Louisville, Atchison preferred and Manhattan. The latter was weak on threatened increased competition by the underground road which the Metropolitan jumped to 29 at the opening on the assumption that it would profit by an underground railread being thus relieved of the long haul in its surface cars. The stock later lost 2 points of its advance.
