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"The Liars" at the Lyceum. John Drew is featured as the star of the company which presented Henry Arthur Jones' comedy, "The Liars," at the Lyceum last night, but he is a very unobtrusive star, for the very excellent reason that Mr. Jones has written a comedy instead of a vehicle to exploit a star. The audience liked it all the better for that. It's hard to construct a comedy for a star and preserve the interest, humor and dramatic unities Mr. Jones has reached that happy period of his career as a writer for the stage when he no longer has to try. He does not have to erect comedies to order.

In "The Liars" he has divided the interest to advantage between four leading characters. There is never a dull moment, the stage never waits and there is no necessity for whirtwind climaxes to tide the comedy over the period when the star is taking a breathing spell.

There will be a wide difference of opinion about the desirability of taking as the base of a comedy the theme which Mr. Jones selected, but there can be no dissent from the opinion that it is a marvelously well constructed play. The atmosphere may be faulty; it undeniably is, but few theatre-goers will and any particular fault with that, They like or dislike a play for what hey foundly believe is its moral rather than its atmosphere, and if they consider "The Liars" long enough they can und the moral, and, what is altogether excellent about the comedy, can find just the kind of a moral they most de-

Mr. Drew as Sir Christopher beering was very subdued for Mr. Drew, his eyes and mustache playing but unimportant parts in the portraval of the role for which he was cast. By Associated Press. New York, March 29.—The bull move-ment in stocks which started Saturday received its inst material check shortly before noon today. The dealings were considerably above the million sharo mark with nearly a quarter of a million of the transactions in Brooklyn Rapid Transit. The sensutional advances in the forenoon brought about realizing sales on an enormous scale in the late session. Brooklyn Transit made an extreme ad-vance of 9 points, dropped over 8 and closed with a net advance of 5 points from the top in this stock which sold to-day over 100 points above figures pre-valing fast April, was on large blocks of stocks thrown over by the traders but on the decline supporting purchases by the parties identified with the property resulted in a rally. As in the manipula-tion of this stock many brokers refused and it is difficult to say whether the de-cline was on genuine realizing or to shake of an undesirable following. Rubber, Atchison preferred and the Coalers. The Granger stocks showed good gains in the early part of strength and recoded at the rest of the market in the early afternoon. The mar-ket closed weak and active with many share losses. The total sales were 1.14.500 shares: Railroad bonds participated fully in the vagaries of stocks today but th range was well within the point of the most active issues. Total sales were \$1,-345.000. United States government bonds were unchanged in bid quotations.
