

EASTER SERVICES IN THE CHURCHES

PROGRAMMES THAT WILL BE OBSERVED TOMORROW.

Unusual Interest Has Been Taken in Arranging the Services Which Will Be of an Imposing Nature—In Harmony with the Joyous Nature of the Festival, Music Will Have a Big Place in All of the Services in the Churches.

Unusual interest has been taken this year in the preparations for the services that will be conducted tomorrow in the city churches. Below are given many of the programmes that will be observed:

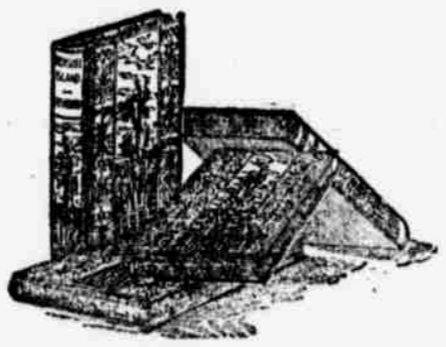
