#### A REMARKABLE LETTER.

Written by a Prisoner in the County Jail to the Commissioners.

Many queer letters reach the county commissioners from men in the county jail who are anxious to secure their liberty. The one given below was written by a prisoner released this week and is marked by a deep earnestness, besides being some evidence that the prisoner has a firm grasp on the king's English. The letter is as fol-

Lackawanna Co. Jail, Scranton, Pa

March, 26th, 1899. To The Hon, Board of Commissioner Gentlem:-I am incarcerated in the Lackawanna County, Jail or the past two months for the statutory burgiary of \$7 and 18 cents. Gentlem. It is my first offence, and, It will be my last. first offence, and, It will be my last. I have never heretofore done anything detrimental to my character. And would not have been in my present predicament but for drink. Drink. Which has a tendency to drive any man to that imbecility which presages extermination I have a poor widowed mother entirely dependent on me for sustenance. I can truly say that not a day passes (perhaps, I might with equal veracity say an hour) In which I do not think of mother. But its extraordinary how I was so foolish as to precipitate myself into my present entanglement. I have always lived a tanglement. I have always lived a good and unimpeachable life so far, and have never committed any act of the slightest nature derogatory to my character, My confinement in a prison cell for the past three months, includ-ing. The time I was waiting for Court, Has, entirely put me in a weak and dilapidated condition, especially, as I havn't got no recreation since my term of imprisonment I have a situation waiting for me until next Wednesday.

And If I am not liberated then I shall in all probability have lost it. I havn't a dollar to my name Neither has my poor mother. I am therefore ap-pealing to your Honorable Body to liberate me, as, I am not able to pay the costs of the prosectution. My term of imprisonment expires on the 29th last. And if your Honorable Body, leaves me stay in Jail for the costs. It will bring my mothers gray hairs down with sorrow to an early grave. I am her only joy and comfort, to cherish her declining years. I am therefore asking your Honorable Body to forgive costs and liberate me I begging the favor in gods name, God, who in his last moments on the cross on Mount Calvary forgave his enemies, When his blood ran down in great drops to ground. Eo also, I ask your Honourable Body in Gods name and for Gods sake to forgive me and lib-erate me from a felons cell. And in conclusion 1 will mention That. If your Honourable Body discharges me. I Shall turn over a new leaf, for in-deed, I have enough of prison life and by a letter received by Mrs. Pease from deed, I have enough of prison fite and dicipline. I therefore promise your Honourable Body, That if liberated, I Shall never bother this court again. But try and be a valuable acquisition to my poor Mother the remainder of her time on this earth. And equally so try and do right with god and man

#### THE REMAINS OF PRIVATE PEASE

ARRIVED IN THIS CITY YESTER-DAY FROM SANTIAGO.

At 11 O'clock This Morning They Will Be Taken to Clark's Green. Services Will Be Conducted in the Baptist Church by the Rev. Robert F. Y. Pierce, of Penn Avenue Church-Firing Squad from Company C Will Attend the Funeral.

The soldiers and other friends, outside of the immediate relatives, will go on the 1.05 train to Clark's Summit and from there will proceed to the Clark's Green Baptist church, where the services will be held at 2 o'clock. Rev. Robert F. Y. Pierce, of the Penn Avenue Baptist church, will officiate. A firing squad composed of the mem-

ers of Company C will accompany the remains to Clark's Green. Captain Robling requests all members of the company, who can do so, to attend the funeral. Mr. and Mrs. Pease have a letter from

their martyred young son that they treasure very highly. It was written while he was sick with the fever at Santiago and was dated a few days before his death. It ends abruptly and is not signed, evidently not having been finished. His tentmate, it is presumed, found it after his death and forwarded

In the letter he speaks of his serious condition and expresses the hope that he will live until August 3, when he would be a full year in the army. He died August 4.

Another evidence that he realized a lady in Tampa, Fla. When the soldiers were in Tampa this lady met Private Pease and gave him a bible. He promised to send it back to her as a souvenir when the war was over.

During the month of August this lady received her bible back. Accompanying it was a letter from Private Pease enclosing \$2, and a request that she accept the \$2 in payment for the bible and send the latter on to his mother. The lady, however, wished to keep the bible and wrote to Mrs. Pease, explaining the circumstances, sending on the \$2 and stating that she would not care to part with the bible. Mrs. Pease reluctantly acquiesced.


