ABLE SERMON ANENT RACE TROUBLES IN THE SOUTH.

Delivered by the Rev. J. P. Moffatt at the Washburn Street Presbyterian Church Last Night-Speaker Opines That the Gospel and Education Are the Only Perfect Remedies-Marriage of Miss Elizabeth Jones and Edmund Lewis-Entertainment and Social.

Rev. J. P. Meffal, of the Washburn Street Presbyterian church, spoke last evening on the race troubles in the South and the cure for such atroclous outbreaks as are frequently reported from the Southern states. He said the subject was practical, is interesting the whole country and is the greatest problem this country has ever had to deal with. We do not appreciate the events transpiring in the Southern The people here are horrified beyond expression at the outrageous punishment inflicted on the colored race by so-called Christians who indulge in mob law.

The 1-unishment is more atroclous than the deed itself, and it would indicate that we are living in a dark age. Many years ago it was prophesied that the race would die out, but it has increased instead of diminishing, and it is estimated that in 2004 the colored population will have increased to 64,000,000 if the present rate is any criterion.

There are millions of them who need the gospel and seek education. The government has not been awakened to the responsibility and inevitable consequences will follow if the colored people are not Christianized, citizenized and educated. There are 8,000,000 of them in the United States, and their claims for recognition are particularly strong.

The way to meet their requirements is by educational influences and the power of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Unless an effort is put forth by the government and the churches, we will have a question to solve that will be impossible to conceive. The lack of speedy action in the law on the part of the authorities will eventually be detrimental and justice will become a by-word and mob law prevail if something is not done soon.

The nunishment meted out to the criminals in Georgia recently is only worthy of the barbarisms of a thousand years ago, and the men engaged ie the punishment will carry the thoughts of it to their graves, and will never want to speak of it to their children. They love freedom and have demonstrated their willingness to right and die for their country. It is desirable among the race that their children acquire a better standing, morally, intellectually and spiritually than their parents received, and their educational needs are far from being

There must be recognition on the part of the white people and the establishment of schools and churches to overcome this condition, if the race problem is to be de-


