Wall Street Review.

By Associated Press. New York, May 12.-The bulls had the better of the speculative contest today but the edge was taken off the rise in the last few minutes of trading by a vigor-ous bear raid. The continued purchases for London account and the lack of strain in either the money or sterling exchange markets was features of confidence. Moreover it was announced that the final \$5,000,000 warrant in connection with the Spanish indemnity would be deposited on Monday in a local bank which announced that all the needed exchange had been secured and this was favorably interpre-tated as to its probable effect on sterling exchange.
