O'MALLEY VERDICT IS SUSTAINED

PLAINTIFF WAS INJURED ON THE TROLLEY ROAD.

On the First Trial of the Case a Non-Suit Was Granted and on Its Second Hearing a Verdict in Favor and yesterday the decision of the court of O'Malley for \$4,675-When a New Trial Was Refused an Appeal Was Taken to the Supreme Court, Which Has Sustained the Local Court-Other Court Matters.

The Supreme court at Philadelphia yesterday handed down an opinion affirming the judgment of the court of this county in the case of Thomas O'Malley against the Scranton Railvay company. O'Malley in January,

1898, obtained a verdict for \$4,675. On January 27, 1894, O'Malley, while in the employ of the Barber Asphalt company, was working between the rails of the Scranton Railway company en North Washington avenue. He was run down by a car and sustained many severe bruises and serious injury to the

In the fall of 1894, O'Malley brought suit against the company to recover damages and in 1896 the case was heard before Judge Archbald, who granted a
