On the night of October #8, 1896, Mrs harles Kaiser, while driving with her easband about one mile from Bridgeport Pa., was shot in the head and instantly killed. The husband declared they were attacked by a highwayman and exhibited a wound in his own arm in proof of his tory. The discovery that the woman's ife had been insured for several thouand dollars brought suspicion upon the husband. He was arrested and then the detectives set to work to unravel the tangled skein of the plot that led up to he murder.

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


