

AVOID SPRING FEVER

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RELIGIOUS.

In the injunction proceedings of Rev. I. N. W. Irvine, rector of St. John's Protestant Episcopal church, of Huntington, Pa., and the wardens and the vestrymen against Bishop Talbot and the standing committee of the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania, proceedings to restrain the bishop from dissolving the pastoral relations of Mr. Irvine, Judge Woodward Thursday morning made the following decree:

"Now May 23, the motion to continue the preliminary injunction as heard, and by agreement of the parties hereto, the injunction is modified so as to restrain any and all action to dissolve the pastoral relation between the Rev. I. N. W. Irvine and the parish of St. John's Episcopal church, of Huntington, Pa., contrary to said canon 4 of the General Digest; and the preliminary injunction so amended is continued until further ordered." Rev. Mr. Irvine was at one time a resident of this city.

Thursday morning the fifty-second annual convention of the Evangelical Lutheran Ministerium of Pennsylvania and adjacent states opened in Trinity Lutheran church, corner Sixth and Washington streets, Reading. Trinity church is an historic edifice, and it is not the first time that this body has gathered within its walls. The congregation was organized in 1751, but three years after the first house was built in Reading. Rev. Henry Melchior Muhlenberg, the founder of the Lutheran church in America, was one of its early advisers. Rev. Muhlenberg frequently preached in the first church of the congregation, a log building. He travelled all through this section among the faith. The present edifice was erected in 1791. The ministerium was organized in 1748 by a few ministers, representing scattered congregations. Now it embraces in round numbers more than 500 congregations, 340 pastors, professors and missionaries, a communicant membership of more than 127,000, and more than 55,000 Sunday school pupils, with 8,000 officers and teachers.
