Wall Street Boview. By Associated Press. New York, May 27.—There was a marked disposition in the Stock ex-change dealing to sunder the speculation in railroads and in the industrial spe-clattes. The immobility of the standard railroad stocks in face of the demoral-ized opening in Sugar and Metropolitan Street Railway was strikingly like the midsummer markets of yore, when Sugar was likely to absorb a half to three-quarters of the total dealings and when many of the industrials now traded in had not yet been conceived. The bears seened to have gathered fresh courage and made quite a savage onsiaught upon Sugar, the Tobacco stocks, the New York municipal stocks, smelling and steel wire losses in the railway were in-significant in most cases. There was a aimultaneous decline in New York Cen-tral and Pennsylvania, which was in rath-or marked contrast to the later strength of some of the so-called differential trunk lines. The first hour had not ex-pired before an active demand sprang up for the Reading securities, based on the strong showing of the April statement of earnings. A decrease in operating ex-penses of the coal company and an in-crease in gross earnings by the railroad company combined to produce an increase in all the companies of \$107,618. In con-nection with the good report submitted by New Jersey Central earlier in the week and the May gross earnings of Ontario and Western, the coalers developed quits a buoyant and enjoyed substantial gains all around. Erie first preferred shared in the advantage. In connection with the plethoric condition here disclosed by the weekly bank statement there is some re-newed apprehension of gold exports. The demand for railroad bonds continued strong at advancing prices. Reading 4s being most conspicuous. The exchange will remain closed until Wednesday. To-tal sales of stocks today, 243,700 shares.

Consolidated Gas lost about three points, stimulated by the re-duction of the dividend. The other in-dustrials were heavy. Brooklyn Rapid Transit losing two points and Metropol-itan about four. The strength in the coal stocks was generally attributed to the speculativa interest which has been buillab on these stocks for quite a little while. The April statement of Reading was presumed to wance. Prices were bid up on relatively small trading at about yesterday's prices. The market was a genuine hol-day one and from its action would indi-cate the prospect of a better market next week. Crop reports instead of improv-ing, got worse; and now the minimum damage to winter wheat is placed at 100-009 hushels with a probability of its reaching 135,000,000.
