

How Meissonier Painted From Nature.

Vasili Verestschagin, the famous Rus lan painter, contributes to the XIX Cen tury an article on his distinguished French contemporary from which we take the following extract: "How did you paint the snowy road your picture of 'Napoleon in 1814?" I
