PRINTING BY X-RAYS.

A Process That Is Apparently Destined to Be a Success. From the Boston Transcript.

Georbe Izamboard, who has been experimenting in Paris with the Roentgen rays, in the hope of adapting them to commercial use in the printing industry, announces that he has succeeded in producing a machine for the pur-He reasoned that if the X-rays would pentrate oaken logs they ought to penerate piles of paper, and that as photograps could be taken with X-rays it ought to be possible to reproduce a picture of printing through every sheet of a pile of paper. The invention is so far matured that M. Izamboard is able to expose a pile of paper be-tween two Crookes tubes and print both sides of all the sheets in the pile at the same time. He can also place a series of piles of paper around a Crookes tube, making use of the Xrays by radiating them from a center. It was suggested many years ago that the printing of the future would be done by electricity, operating, not on
