Collector of Internal Revenue T. F. Penman has been notified by the de-partment at Washington to forbid bank officials to attach stamps to checks and requiring those who issue them to canof the gummed label according to law. The order received by Mr. Penman is

You are directed to notify the banks that are guilty of stamping unstamped checks that if the practice is not imediately discontinued they will be peported to the United States district atorney for prosecution.

The instruction contained in treasury decision No. 19,606, under date of June 29, 1828, to the effect that there was no objection to the affixing by the banks of the requisite stamps to an unstamped check presented for payment is hereby revoked.

This instruction was given to meet an emergency immediately preceding the taking effect of the stamp act on July 1, 1898, in order to obviate the necessity of returning by the banks thouEDUCATIONAL.
