ould include an act prohibiting the landing of girls brought here for immoral purposes. There was no such prohibition in the present laws.

Cheap Labor.

William Weihe, of the contract labor bureau, who was formerly president of the Amalgamated Association of Iron and Steel Workers, said that the largest per cent, of the cheap labor coming here were Slovaks, Polaks and Russian Poles, went to Pennsylvania, where they not only worked on railroads and in the mines, but entered into competition in the industrial centres in the iron and glass works. "It has been shown," said Mr

Weihe, "that the companies give the preference to foreigners, even when skilled American workmen offer to work for the same wages. In 1897 a tin plate mill at Harrisburg brought to this country two roll turners from Wales at \$35 and \$30 a week respectively. We had the letters sent to these men in which these salaries were promised. They were written on the company's letter head by the manager. The men came here and went to work. We could not prove that the president had authorized the manager to hirs the men and as the manager was a hired man the company could not be prosecuted."

Dr. Egisto Rossi, chief of the Italian breau at the barge office, said his bureau was supported by the Italian government. His government did not encourage emigration to this country. The bureau had been established here to regulate padrone system and for the purpose of keeping a record of Italian immigrants arriving in this country,

While he would not say his bureau had destroyed the padrone system, yet he had been able to prevent many new arrivals from Italy coming into contact with the bankers and padrones in this city.

Colonists Defined.

"Do you still regard Italian immigrants in this country as colonists?" asked Chairman Smythe.

"We consider as colonists all Itallans who have not taken out naturalization papers and notified the Italian government that they should renounce allegiance to King Humbert."

"Is it true that you issued a circular letter on April 21 last in which you said that, owing to the war with Spain, labor and industry had ceased in this country, and advised your government not to grant passports to intending immigrants?"

'No; the person who gave you such information did not understand my Italian circular. Many persons were arriving from Italy with insufficient funds and 1 simply called upon the government to urge upon the mayors and prefects the necessity of being careful in issuing passports, the more so as this country was engaged in a war and industrial enterprises were in a measure suspended."

"We have been informed that certain Italian government officials are interested in sending contract laborers to this country and share the profits with the padrone," said Major Farquhar.

"I do not believe it possible," said Dr. Rossi. "I should like names and American foremen acting for data. Americans contractors have been employing the methods of the padrone since we have been able to repress the operations of the latter.







