CONCERNING IMMIGRANTS

TESTIMONY GIVEN BEFORE INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION.

Style of Passengers That First Become Public Charges—The Present Act Against Contract Labor Does Not Restrict—The Chief Matron, Mrs. Virginia Stuckler, Makes Suggestions.

New York, July 26.—At today's session of the sub-committee of the United States Immigration Commission, Edwin Dobbler, chief of the boarding inspectors of immigration at the large office, testified that his experience was that clerks coming to the United States in the second cabin with \$10 or \$50 were the "first to become public charges."

Dr. Lorenzo Ullo, legal advisor of the immigration bureau, said there was great difficulty in enforcing the laws relating to the many contracts found in the statutes relative to immigration.

Mrs. Stuckler said that there was an average of one marriage a day at the landing bureau. Thirty-one women arrived who had been unfaithful to their husbands but except in three cases were permitted to land.

William Welthe, of the contract labor bureau, who was formerly president of the Amalgamated Association of Iron and Steel Workers, said that the largest per cent. of the cheap labor coming here were Slovaks, Poles and Russians.

Dr. Egisto Rossi, chief of the Italian bureau at the large office, said his bureau was supported by the Italian government. His government does not encourage emigration to this country.

Colonists Defined. "Do you still regard Italian immigrants in this country as colonists?" asked Chairman Smythe.

Dr. Rossi, "I should like names and details. American foremen acting for American contractors have been employing the methods of the padrone since we have been able to repress the operations of the latter."
