BOSTWICK TO ANSWER IN FEDERAL COURT

HEARING IN THE MONTROSE POSTOFFICE CASE.

Government Adds Little of an Incriminating Nature to the Testimony Previously Outlined in The Tribune—The Defense by Its Cross-Examination Tends to Show That Postmaster Stoddard and Clerk Mack Are Quite as Much Open to Suspicion as the Accused.

The hearing of George M. Bostwick, assistant postmaster at Montrose, on the charge of filing registered letters, took place yesterday afternoon before Commissioner George D. Taylor at his office in the Liberty building.

IT HAD THE MARKS. The Inspector Had Postmaster Stoddard Take it out of the Box and Take note of its Number and Series and Also of a Small Dash Under One of the Letters in the Lower Left Hand Corner of the Face of the Bill.

DEFENSE IS A DENIAL. The defense is a plain denial of all knowledge of the theft, augmented by evidence to show that Postmaster W. B. Stoddard, of this city, and C. E. Mack also had access to the letter and that each was alone in the office for a more or less extended time during the period that the letter remained in the office.

A number of the close friends and relatives of the accused, including his wife and her father, A. B. Burns, one of the most prominent men of Montrose, were present at the hearing.

STODDARD'S VISIT. On the night that the theft is alleged to have taken place the witness was in Washington at 11 o'clock.

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COMPLAINTS CONTINUED. The complaints continued to come in right along and up to the time of Mr. Bostwick's arrest they numbered about twenty-five.

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During a lengthy cross-examination he told that he was in the office for an hour in the early morning and again when Mr. Bostwick was at supper.

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RALLY OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUERS

HELD LAST EVENING IN THE ASBURY M. E. CHURCH.
