Wall Street Review, By Associated Press.

New York, Aug. 4.-Today's stock market was largely devoted to dealings in a few industrial specialties. There was a marked tendency to realize in the railroad list, but the selfling pressure there was not heavy and offers decreased as prices declined. Union Pacific was subject to pressure by unconfirmed rumors of a strike on its lines. The stock broke 11/2 points on rather liberal offerings and closed at a net loss of a point. The preferred declined %. The chief movement of the day was in tobacco stocks and Tennessee Coal. American tobacco gained an extreme four points, Continental tobacco common 3%, the preferred 514 and Tennessce coal 215. Late in the day prices of these were suddenly let down from 14a24 points, apparently with the purpose of shaking off weak followers of the bull movement. A rumor of great combinations of coal and iron interests in the south was added to those recently current to explain the Tennessee coal movement. The vigorous advance of this stock begot some sympathetic strength in other stocks in the same industry. Colorado fuel, Hocking coal, Federal steel, American smelting and a number of other stocks advanced from a fraction to over a point. People's Gas was up at one time over a point on reports of the company's prosperous condition. There were gains in isolated interests elsewhere, notably in St. Paul and Omaha, Chicago Great Western preferred, Kansas City, Pittsburg and Gulf, Pittsburg, C., C. and St. Louis common and preferred, National Biscuit and New York air brake ranging from 1 to 314. On the other hand sugar was most heavy of the day on account of the shading of prices in some grades of refined sugar. The local traction stocks showed weakness throughout and Consolidated Gas lost 31/2 per cent. net. Today's speculative leaders closed feverish and unsettled, but the general tone was firm at the City, Pittsburg and Gulf firsts rose 31/2 per cent.
