# THE MARKETS.

Wall Street Review,

New York, Aug. 11.-The stock market made some show of activity and strength in the early dealings today but the movement has about exhausted itself before the end of the first hour. The heavy tone in many railroad stocks affected the industrial specialties which helped the bears. market refused to go up again and drifted quite aimlessly for the rest of the day, the volume of business falling to the lowest abb. The stocks which made the early activity were the iron and steel and leather stocks. Some of the former group had quite handsome net gains remaining at the close of the Federal steel and Colorado fuel being the only ones in the group to show not losses. Tennessee Coal was touched \$21½, but failed to make its net gain a whole point. There was a tremndous scramble to take on S. Leather and the price touched 10%. Practically the whole of its gain was wiped out in a realizing movement and the preferred stock lapsed below lats night. There were a few strong spots in the railroad list, notably hicago, Great Western debentures, which are up 1% and Missouri, Kansas & Texas both common and preferred. Oregon Navigation lost 2% of its recent rise. A few railroad stocks showed fractional gains but the general tone was heavy. Total sales 400,000.
