



ERNST PLANS MODEL TOWN.

Broadway Merchant Will Build Houses at New Orange for His Employes.

Max Ernst, the wholesale clothing dealer of No. 715 Broadway, will strike a blow at the sweat-shop system on the East Side. He has contracted for the erection at New Orange, a subuch of Elizabeth, N. J., of factories de signed for 800 operatives, for whom he will build two or three hundred houses in the neighborhood.

The houses will represent an investment of about \$200,000 and they will br sold to the employes, who will pay about \$6.50 a month. "It is not necessary for me to dwell

"In New Orange I intend to encourage the formation of unions, get ,acquainted with my workmen, establish cooking schools for girls, manual training schools for young men and night schools for grown persons.
