New York, Aug. 21 .- There was a hattle royal between the bulls and the bears on the Stock Exchange today. The bulls had somewhat the advantage of position, as they were entrenched behind a large and well distributed delist was surprisingly uniform. But there were spots in the industrial list which proved exceedingly vulnerable and the firm and persistent determination with which the bears raided these resulted in wiping out the majority of gains which had been achieved in the railroads and reducing practically all suffered to the extent of 3%. 
