While browsing about in the pasture near the quarry the cow swallowed a small dynamite cartridge. At 5 o'clock Michael Brannagan, jr., came to the pasture to drive the cows to the milk-ing lot. The Jersey refused to accompany the other cows, when young Brannagan hit her on the side with a

club, and a terrific explosion ensued. The cow was shattered into hundreds of pieces, some of them being hurled an eighth of a mile into the air, but he escaped death or serious injury by falling into a deep creek, from which he was rescued by the quarrymen.
