

EVENTS OF DAY IN WEST SCRANTON

CORNER STONE LAYING AT ST. MARK'S CHURCH.

Exercises Will Occur Tomorrow Afternoon—Address by Rev. William Ashmead Schaeffer—Annual Rally Day at Presbyterian Church. Miners Hold a Mass Meeting. News of the Churches and Religious Societies—Other Smaller Paragraphs and Personal Mention.

On Sunday afternoon will take place the laying of the corner stone of the new church of St. Mark's Lutheran congregation, corner Fourteenth and Washburn streets. The wall is completed and the work of erecting the edifice will be pushed as rapidly as possible. A few historical facts of the congregation may be noted. The initiatory steps of establishing a church in this place were taken April 5, 1891, when a Sunday school was organized by Rev. E. L. Miller, then pastor of Holy Trinity Lutheran church, in the city. St. Mark's congregation was organized on Sept. 7, of the same year. The corner stone of the present chapel was laid Nov. 13, 1892, and the chapel first occupied for worship, Feb. 19, 1893. The congregation had taken steps for erecting a new church during the summer of 1898, but owing to adverse circumstances work was postponed until this year. There are still many difficulties to be overcome, but yet everything looks promising for a successful issue.
