CARBONDALE. THE SCHOOL BOARD. Instead of kicking on the school tax the taxpayers of this district should show their appreciation of the economical way in which the board of control is managing its affairs. Last year with a reduced state appropriation and a smaller tax duplicate, the board has by judicious work saved nearly \$3,000, besides providing more schools than ever. This money is in the bank and will be used for bond redemption. The recent bond issue—originated by Treasurer Dimock and successfully carried through by the board—brought an immediate profit of \$2,000 and will save the district nearly \$400 annually for twenty years. Instead of paying six per cent on \$120,000 it is paying five more than three and one-quarter. The school board has certainly distinguished itself by able financing.
