CORNER STONE OF ST. MARK'S CHURCH LAID WITH APPROPRIATE EXERCISES YESTERDAY. Ceremonies Attended by a Large Gathering of People—Addresses Delivered by Rev. W. C. L. Lauer, Rev. C. G. Spieker and Rev. John Randolph—Contents of the Cornerstone and List of Contributions—History of the Church from Its Inception.

The corner stone of the new St. Mark's Evangelical Lutheran church, at the corner of Washburn and Fourteenth streets, was laid with appropriate exercises yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

After the singing of "Gloria Patri," Rev. Spieker read Scripture selections, followed by prayer by Rev. Ramer. Rev. William Ashmead Schaeffer, of Philadelphia, superintendent of missions, who was to have delivered the principal address, was unable to be present and sent a letter of regret, which was read by Rev. Ramer.

SUDDEN DEATH OF VENERABLE PRIEST REV. JOHN LOUGHRAN, OF MINOOKA, DIED YESTERDAY. Second Oldest Priest in the Scranton Diocese—Was Outing for a Drive Saturday Evening and Was Not Thought to Be Seriously Affected Although Ailing for Several Months—Has Been in the Ministry for Over Forty Years—Sketch of His Life and Work.

Rev. John Loughran, of Minooka, one of the pioneer priests of this diocese and the oldest in it but one, died rather suddenly of heart disease in the parochial residence yesterday morning at 11:15 o'clock.

SKETCH OF HIS LIFE. Father Loughran was born in Dorsey, county Armagh, Ireland, Feb. 18, 1831. He attended the national schools and afterwards graduated from St. Patrick's college in the city of Armagh. Soon afterwards he came to the city of Scranton, Pa., where he was ordained a priest on July 3, 1857, by Bishop Newman.

HAD A LARGE FIELD. Since he took charge of St. Joseph's parish it has had a wonderful growth, there already having been two new churches created from it, the one at Taylor in charge of Rev. L. A. Moffatt, and the other at Rendham, in charge of Rev. Father Jordan. He performed all the work of this immense parish all alone until a few years ago, when an assistant was appointed.
